TAG QUESTIONS: GRAMMAR

POSITIVE + NEGATIVE (SAME AUX VERB)

- This is a tag question, isn't it?
- She <u>lives</u> in Shimane, <u>doesn't she</u>?
- You have been to Tokyo, haven't you?
- They will understand this lesson, won't they?

NEGATIVE + POSITIVE (SAME AUX VERB)

- This <u>isn't</u> a normal question, <u>is it</u>?
- She doesn't live in Hamada, does she?
- You <u>haven't</u> been to Okinawa, <u>have you?</u>
- They <u>can't</u> understand this lesson, <u>can they?</u>

MAKE A TAG QUESTION

- 1. You don't like animals, do you?
- 2. You eat chocolate, don't you?
- 3. We shouldn't be here, should we?
- 4. You haven't seen this TV show, have you?
- 5. They aren't coming, are they?

TAG QUESTIONS: INTONATION

FALLING: MORE CERTAIN (Accusatory)

- This is a tag question, isn't it? ∇
- You didn't finish your homework, did you?
- You haven't seen this topic before, have you?

RISING: LESS CERTAIN (Checking info)

- She lives in Shimane, doesn't she?
- You have been to Tokyo, haven't you?
- You haven't been to Okinawa, have you?
